              MR. CHAIRMAN: Okay. John Day.

              MR. DAY: We got the school letters for the first

     schools. They're all mailed out. And all school letters

    are done. So each week we're going to be mailing out

    different letters for different schools.

              And the plotter, new plotter is going to be
    delivered this week and they're going to be setting it up

    next week. And we'll be testing it next week to make sure

    that everything works with it. And I'm pretty much sure

- 1 that I got everything all set up for them guys, what they
- 2 have to get done and everything. All the dates that they
- 3 have to get done.
- 4 Hopefully I'm back before the ballots get done,
- 5 printed.
- 6 That's it.
- 7 MR. CHAIRMAN: Okay. Tim Dowling.
- 8 MR. DOWLING: Petitions, as it stands right now,
- 9 Tuesday, March 12th, will be the deadline to file. The door
- 10 will close at five. Anybody that's in line by 5:00 their
- 11 petitions will be accepted and processed.
- March 20th, which is the next Wednesday after
- 13 that, will be the drawing.
- 14 That will be held here at Delaware and Spring
- 15 Garden in this hearing room here.
- 16 The way that we're going to handle the petitions
- on the 12th is, we're going to have all hands on deck
- 18 accepting the petitions, clocking them in, writing the
- 19 receipts.
- 20 And on March 13th, the next day, which will be the
- 21 Wednesday, will be the first day that people can review
- 22 them.

- 23 I'm not going to be able to make any copies on
- 24 that day.

- 1 We have 95 people that picked up for Traffic
- 2 Court. That doesn't mean that they're all going to turn
- 3 them in. But 95 people, plus all the board workers, it's
- 4 going to be a very hectic day in Room 142.
- 5 And right now the way it's going to work, anybody
- 6 who requests copies, we have an order form all set up. And
- 7 it's first in, first out.
- 8 Whoever puts their request in first gets it done
- 9 first, and then we'll go in chronological order as people
- 10 put their request in.
- 11 We have a new set up. Hopefully, it will go
- 12 faster and there won't be a long wait for people.
- 13 And that's about it.
- 14 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: With providing copies to
- 15 people, as I understand, you're putting a system in place
- 16 where you can provide them electronically in some cases?
- 17 MR. DOWLING: There could -- I mean, we could burn
- 18 it to a CD.
- 19 I wouldn't want anybody putting a flash drive into
- 20 a City computer --
- 21 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: Oh, no. I agree.
- 22 MR. DOWLING: -- because we don't know what's on
- 23 that flash drive and what could happen to our computer
- 24 system.

- 1 If we print them out they're going to be printed
- 2 out on 11-by-17 pages. And it's going to be duplex front
- 3 and back. The petition will be Page 1, side 1, side 2 will
- 4 all be one page.
- 5 And that will be -- each page is going to cost a
- 6 dollar to the requester.
- 7 We could also burn to a CD. And then it could be
- 8 incumbent on the challenger or the person requesting that
- 9 they would have to print them out themselves.
- 10 But the past practice has been people want those
- 11 hard copies so that they can see them.
- 12 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: Has anyone filed yet?
- 13 MR. DOWLING: We've had one person file for
- 14 Traffic Court, and that's it.
- 15 Nobody -- we've been getting drips and drabs of
- 16 individual judges of elections, inspector of elections. But
- 17 nothing in mass yet.
- 18 COMMISSIONER SINGER: And is there any impediment
- 19 to e-mailing images to people who want them by E-mail? Is
- 20 E-mail available on the computer where the images are?
- MR. DOWLING: No. No.
- 22 COMMISSIONER SINGER: E-mail is not available --
- 23 MR. DOWLING: It is a closed system. I don't want
- 24 anything coming into it or going out of it. That's for

- 1 security.
- 2 MR. CHAIRMAN: Absolutely.
- 3 COMMISSIONER SINGER: Got it.
- 4 MR. DOWLING: Yeah. That's a stand-alone system.
- 5 COMMISSIONER SINGER: And when you say, all hands
- 6 on deck, how many people is that exactly?
- 7 MR. DOWLING: I have three permanent employees,
- 8 me, plus two other permanent employees, a temp and I believe
- 9 Joe and another staff member will come up to assist.
- 10 COMMISSIONER SINGER: Okay. So five permanent and
- 11 one temp?
- MR. DOWLING: Yeah.
- 13 COMMISSIONER SINGER: Okay. Thank you.
- MR. DOWLING: And the reason that amount is,
- 15 because 142 is cramped and I don't want us walking on top of
- 16 each other.

- 17 So -- and with the number of people who are going
- 18 to be filing, it's going to be hectic.
- 19 MR. CHAIRMAN: Gary Ferris.
- Thank you, Tim.
- MR. DOWLING: You're welcome.
- MR. FERRIS: Good morning, Commissioners.
- 23 We're continuing to work on the polling places,
- 24 securing polling places, calling people who haven't

- 1 responded.
- 2 We have hearings that will be set up in front of
- 3 the three Commissioners. That will be on April 3rd.
- 4 We will have that broken down into two sessions,
- 5 at 9:00 in the morning and then at 1:00 in the afternoon
- 6 after the Sunshine Meeting. That will be held here on the
- 7 sixth floor.
- 8 You have a list there. There is 30 scheduled
- 9 right now for that date. All the Commissioners received
- 10 that list this week of the final ones that are for that
- 11 date.
- 12 Signs will be posted alerting the public in those
- 13 divisions, and the ward leaders will be notified of those
- 14 changes.
- Besides that we have myself and Seth have a
- 16 meeting with the school district on Tuesday to try to move
- 17 forward with some improvements to -- using HAVA funds to try
- 18 to improve some schools, also.
- 19 So, hopefully, we get some, kind of, good response
- 20 out of that.

- 21 And that's all I have right now. Thank you.
- MR. CHAIRMAN: Okay. Thank you very much, Gary.
- Joe Lynch, please.
- MR. LYNCH: Good morning, Commissioners.

- 1 We're still working on the election materials,
- 2 getting them prepared.
- I sent the database over to John Day, to the
- 4 warehouse, so they can plot the ballots for the seminars,
- 5 and along with the cartridges.
- 6 The seminar -- the first class starts here --
- 7 Monday the 11th. Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday,
- 8 we'll be on the sixth floor here, at Delaware and Spring
- 9 Garden.
- 10 And that's about it.
- I mean, if anybody wants to -- I did put the order
- 12 in for Watcher Certificates. We don't have them yet,
- 13 obviously. But we'll take any requests if anybody wants to
- 14 put a request in for Watchers. They can get them in, we can
- 15 get them looked over. And then when the books come in we
- 16 can start writing them, okay.
- 17 MR. CHAIRMAN: Okay.
- MR. LYNCH: That's it.
- 19 MR. CHAIRMAN: All right. Greg Irving.
- 20 MR. IRVING: Good morning, Commissioners.
- MR. CHAIRMAN: Good morning.
- 22 (Whereupon, documents submitted
- 23 to the Commissioners.)
- 24 MR. IRVING: I'm going to submit to you copies of

- 1 our Voter Registration Statistics.
- 2 Applications have been processed. We've processed
- 3 over 43,000 applications this election period. Currently
- 4 we're processing documents that had dates as of March 5th on
- 5 them. March 5th was yesterday, okay. We've processed over
- 6 43,000.
- 7 Out of 43,000, 9300 have been paper documents, the
- 8 rest have been electronic.
- 9 Our five-year notices, we've received 800
- 10 responses to those, and they have all been processed.
- 11 The majority of that 800 so far are people who are
- 12 confirmed that they still reside at the exact same address.
- 13 We've had probably two different groups come in
- 14 starting to review their own petitions.
- 15 By that, they're looking at their own circulators
- 16 to make sure that they are valid, indeed, and they're also
- 17 checking some of their own signatures.
- 18 Other than that, that completes what the computer
- 19 room is up to.

- 20 COMMISSIONER SINGER: And do we have a status
- 21 report on -- on -- remember there were all those trays of
- 22 mail that was returned to us that we were wondering whether
- 23 the large volume was due to something -- it didn't seem --
- 24 it seemed out of the ordinary?

- 1 MR. IRVING: Well, in the meeting that we had with
- 2 the post office, which you sat in on, Commissioner, what
- 3 they basically explained to us was, there is a phrase at the
- 4 top of the card which states, if it is not delivered within
- 5 five days please return.
- 6 So that's why the bulk of those get returned,
- 7 because they're not delivered in five days. Which is a
- 8 little bit rough to do, in my estimate.
- 9 But --
- 10 COMMISSIONER SINGER: So, that's on the post
- 11 office they're not delivered.
- 12 MR. IRVING: Right.
- 13 Because of the statement. It's on the actual ID
- 14 card.
- 15 COMMISSIONER SINGER: No. I'm sorry.
- So, who's -- so, who -- if something isn't
- 17 delivered within five days --
- 18 MR. IRVING: We don't deliver.
- 19 So that would be the post office.
- 20 COMMISSIONER SINGER: Right. Okay. Thank you.
- 21 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: And they're first-class
- 22 mail; right?

- MR. IRVING: Yes. They are.
- 24 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: Okay. I thought they were

- 1 required by law to deliver first-class mail within two to
- 2 three days.
- 3 MR. IRVING: Because of the statement, I don't
- 4 have one, but I'll get you one after the meeting, there's a
- 5 statement on there that says, if it's not delivered within
- 6 five days please return.
- 7 COMMISSIONER SCHMIDT: Okay.
- 8 MR. IRVING: And they come back to us.
- 9 COMMISSIONER SINGER: And is that -- why is that
- 10 statement there; because we want it there?
- 11 Is it something that the Commission controls that
- 12 statement?
- 13 MR. IRVING: That, I'm not sure of. I'm not sure
- 14 who.
- I can make a phone call and find out --
- 16 COMMISSIONER SINGER: Please.
- 17 MR. IRVING: -- whose language that is on there.
- 18 COMMISSIONER SINGER: Yeah. Thank you.
- MR. CHAIRMAN: Okay. Is there any new business?
- 20 (Whereupon, there was no
- 21 response.)
- 22 MR. CHAIRMAN: All right. Okay. We're going to
- 23 have an Executive Session after this meeting.
